Flamenco Latino (Jackson Heights)

composer Basilio Georges produced Flamenco Latino, a NY-based Flamenco dance company, fusing Flamenco and Afro-Caribbean traditions.

Nā Pua Mai Ka Lani Nūioka presents three pieces highlighting the iconic style of our late Kumu Kale Pawai. These pieces highlight three main creation types: 'uli'uli (rattle gourd implement), wahine (women's line), and kāne (men's line). This selection highlights Kumu Kale's love of continuous motion, flare, and dynamic emotions.

Manhatitlan (Long Island City)

Manhatitlan has been serving its local community for over a decade as a grassroots effort. Seeing a need for dance representation during traditional Mexican celebrations, a group of children, youth and parents with no formal dance experience, came together to begin a self learning process of dancing Mexican Folklore.

Ehsaas - Emotion in Motion*

This Kathak Tarana dance in Raga Shyam Kalyan and teentaal, 16-beat time cycle, unfolds with serene grace, escalating in complexity through rhythmic footwork, emotive gestures and rapid spins, symbolizing the heightened emotion and energy of the piece. The dancers engage in dynamic exchanges, showcasing their virtuosity and mastery of rhythm.

Summer Suite 6: Halo-Halo*

"Summer Suite 6: Halo-Halo" ("Mix Mix" in Tagalog), a dance world premiere showcasing street jazz, contemporary, and hip-hop movement by Filipinx-American director/choreographer, Marc Nuñez. "Halo-Halo," will both dissect and fuse together multiple identities within the Filipinx-American diaspora including Indigenous Filipinx, Southeast Asian, and the colonization by both the Spanish and the Americans. "Halo-Halo" will also include movements inspired by Filipinx folk, Latin styles, and other street styles in collaboration with Emily Hart Lopez and David Cartahena Lee and will feature music by Filipinx Artists like Bruno Mars, H.E.R, and Olivia Rodrigo.
